5. Victorian Society –2016 Top Ten Endangered Buildings

National architectural charity the Victorian Society has released its 2016 Top Ten Endangered Buildings list. All the buildings in the Top Ten are in real risk of being lost if action is not taken in the immediate future. Griff Rhys Jones, Victorian Society Vice President, has urged people living near the buildings on the list to 'seize the opportunity' and campaign to save them. Amongst the Top Ten buildings listed is **Mount Street Hospital, Preston, Lancashire (**<u>Grade II</u>**, 1872, RW Hughes).**

6. Planning Applications

For those who have not spotted these recent planning applications in the press:

Proposed development of **Fishergate Baptist Church** – "change of use from a church to a restaurant & public house including creation of a mezzanine floor".

Proposed development of the 1903 **Preston Post Office** – change of use to a boutique luxury hotel with 60 rooms, restaurant/bar, spa and wedding/function space; accommodation would be over 5 floors with a mezzanine level and roof extension.

7. Lancashire Literature Festival (Oganised by scRibble, the Preston writer's group)

Members may be interested in the Lancashire Literature Festival to be held at the Continental Hotel, South 2 Meadow Lane, Preston PR1 8JP - it will feature history authors on its first day – details are below.

Saturday, Oct 22nd 2.00 pm The Historic Authors

Local author and scRibbler Paul Atherton, Ireland's Tom Hodkinson and Scotland's Margaret Elphinstone will introduce themselves and their work. Each will give an autobiographic intro and readings of their writing, around a 45 minutes presentation each. Afterwards the three will form a panel to take questions.

Paul is author of Viking Voices, under the pen name Vincent Atherton, which tells how the Cuerdale Hoard came to the Ribble. He lives in Hoghton, Lancs and is a former Director of Human Resources with Tata Steel International. He holds an M.A. in Creative Writing from Lancaster and is the Chief scRibbler.

Tim Hodkinson was born and lives in Northern Ireland and is author of novels, Lions of the Grail, The Wasteland, Spear of Crom and the Undead, as well as short stories. He has just sold the option for a TV series of his first novel to Celtic Films. He studied Celtic civilization, Medieval English and Old Norse Literature with a subsidiary in Medieval European History.

Margaret Elphinstone has written two Viking novels, *Islanders* (1994) and *The Sea Road* (2000). Her other historical novels are: *The Incomer, A Sparrow's Flight, Hy Brasil, Voyageurs, Light* and *The Gathering Night*. She has also published a volume of short stories, *An Apple from a Tree*. Margaret is the author of novels as well as poetry and short stories. She is a graduate of Durham University and an Emeritus Professor of Strathclyde University where she was a member of the English Studies Department from 1990-2008.
